3. GRIDS Presentation – Heather Travis (30 minutes)

Questions/Discussions:

Karen L. – Asks how intensification to parking lots is achieved.

Heather T. – GRIDS 2 includes plans of redevelopment to existing sites, including parking lots to feature buildings up to six stories. Plan encourages shopping malls to review parking lots.

KateF.. – Asks what data is used as a base for plan.

Heather T. – 2016 data is used as base data.

Chuck H. – In terms of the modelling, with higher order transit, what happens to intensification nodes if LRT is overturned by council.

Heather T. – The LRT corridor/ B-Line corridor is a priority corridor, at the time of assigning this, it wasn't known what type of transit would be used. In PED's view, intensification will still be encouraged along the line.

Karen L. – Asks how the transportation plan addresses walkability

Heather T. – PED works with the team developing the Transportation Master Plan.

Denis C. – What are public transportation plans around the Airport? When they did technical studies, how much did they look into Climate Change? What type of plan is there for the area on Centennial Parkway north of Barton St. regarding the new GO station? Will there be a shuttle between Barton and the GO station? Heather T. – The Centennial Parkway Secondary Plan has recently been approved, lots of redevelopment is included in it. They are looking at this inhouse. Doesn't know about a shuttle between GO and LRT. PED is working with Staff completing the storm water master plan; they are incorporating Climate Change into their modeling. Growth Plan requires incorporating Climate Change into plans.

Karen L. – Asks if they are working with Forestry and how greenspace is included.

Heather T. – they aren't working with them, but that's a good suggestion.

Denis C. – There was a conference recently that stated that that it's not just about trees, it's about green space and trees and how they benefit the social fabric.

Heather T. – Has read about how urban forestry positively benefits mental health.

Karen L. – Urban Forests benefit water management as well.

Chuck H. – What public consultation has been completed to date? How can CAH get involved?

Catherine P. – Round One consultation was at the end of May and beginning of June, they have two more public open houses planned.

Heather T. – There have been political changes, so original timeline has been impacted. Round Two will probably begin in early 2019. Land needs assessment will follow. They have a stakeholder group as well. Says that someone from CAH could be included.

Trevor I. – Confirmed that they are conducting Phase Two.

Heather T. – They are in Phase Two.

Trevor I. – Sees CAH's Airshed model being impacted by GRIDS 2 outcome, we should collaborate on this.

George M. – Asks about the "What If?" and wonders why the Airshed wasn't incorporated into the base analysis. Thinks a better use than testing possible future impacts.

Heather T. – Suggests that PED should work with PHS sooner rather than later.

Trevor I. – Says that's a good idea.

Fran S. – Asks about the changes in Elfrida.

Heather T. – Elfrida is still under old OMB rules, Elfrida is unknown right now due to 2031 targets not being set. Board hearing begins next week on the matter.

Ed C. – Our committee looks at how the distance from roads impacts human health. With intensification people are closer to major roads, traffic would increase and the negative impacts on people's health would be greater, do they look at this in the process.

Heather T. – They do not look at that the health impacts of intensification, however PHS is at the table

Trevor I. – Environmental assessments were completed for LRT for temporary increased congestion and impact on sub-arterial roads a few years ago, the results were negligible, but there will be a decrease in emissions once the LRT is built.

Karen L. – Says that high buildings near major roads trap pollution

Denis C. – Looking at even bigger picture, our public perception has moved from being a very air polluted city to being a great place to live. There is a close relationship between air quality and the amount that people will pay for a house. Thinks people should keep this in mind when making future plans.

4. Enhanced Fresh Air For Kids Report – Dr. Denis Corr (25 minutes)



Questions/Discussions:

Karen L. – Was the recognition for the 2017 year?

Denis C. – Yes, this was for 2017.

James K. – Do they talk about specific health problems in the schools?

Denis C. – Yes, asthma and heart attacks are discussed.

Ed C. – have you compared the difference between being driven to school and using active transportation?

Denis C. – Kids say that the way they are driven isn't the best way due to routes being through lower air quality areas.

Fran S. – Asks if it is known why Cathy Wever did so well?

Denis C. – They had a very dedicated teacher who helped the students.

Chuck H. – Do we know how much the buses idle?

Denis C. – There is research being done on this. Matt Adams is working on a project on the idling outside of schools.

5. Clean Air Hamilton Facebook Group – Trevor Imhoff (15 minutes)

Trevor I. – Currently only admins can post on Facebook, however as City Employees, we need to look into our social media policies, wants to know what other members think.

Questions/Discussions:

Karen L. – She doesn't think it should be an open forum. Fears that it could go in an undesirable direction. Would be more professional if it was closed and was vetted by an admin.

Chuck H. – No point of having a social media site if it's not public. He's been using Facebook for the courses he teaches, and makes the groups closed. Doesn't believe that there could be controversy in discussion within the group, has worked well with his students. Says to have a closed Facebook group instead of a page.

James K. – We come from diverse backgrounds and we encourage industry participation, worries that conflict could begin between groups with conflicting interests. Likes the way it is now, it's professional, we don't take sides, information is vetted.

Charles H. – Says that outside groups wouldn't be able to post.

James K. – Could cause conflict between committee members. Under original TOR it is stated that CAH is impartial to various groups.

Ed C. – Wants to know original reason for the current Facebook page.

Trevor I. – Originally to have an open discussion board for members to discuss as a group outside of coordinator's emails. We need to know what policies need to be followed by City Staff.

Karen L. – Asks what would be put on the Facebook forum that doesn't go through emails.

Trevor I. – It would be another avenue to share information.

James K. – This wouldn't become a blog, this would be on general air quality information in Hamilton.

Chuck H. – He's on another page and they share their research and went from an email list to a Facebook page.

Trevor I. – Wasn't initially thinking about closed Facebook Group, we are updating our TOR and this may need to be included in it.

Susan N. – Public will see the title, but not the posts if a private Facebook group is used.

Karen L. – Concerned that people won't come to meetings because they are doing all of their communication on Facebook, or that our meetings will lose something in the process.

Kate F. – It's important to see the message as the medium, what is to be shared on Facebook? If you want to share academic information, there are other ways to post, Facebook rules can change and what we post is the property of Facebook. An academic forum might be better for us.

Ed C. – LinkedIn is better for this type of sharing.

Karen L. – If there are conversations going on outside of meetings, that not everyone gets, are we not getting fully informed? Would rather do what we're doing.

Denis C. – Relates to what Karen L. is saying, doesn't use Facebook regularly.

Trevor I. – Says they are all good points. If comments were made on Drop Box, people will receive emails, but people might be saturated with information and not pay attention anymore.

Andy S. – Stelco has a Facebook page to communicate events to people who don't necessarily use email but use Facebook.

Karen L. – Concerned that it takes time to maintain a Facebook page, and the vetting takes up the admin's time.

James K. – No one is making comments on the current page.

Trevor I. – There is a happy medium and we'll need to decide what will work. Trevor I., Bruce N. and Shelley R. will discuss and figure out a solution for our next meeting.

ACTION: Trevor I., Bruce N. and Shelley R. will discuss the potential of a Facebook group and figure out a solution for our next meeting.
