3. Friendly Streets 2017 Project (25 minutes) Elise Desjardins and Beatrice Ekoko



- Completed bike and walk street audits and used PM sensors with GPS, uploaded to the Inhale map
- 65 participants
- Beasley and Gala neighbourhoods
- Multiple audits in the locations, took weather etc. into account
- Went through parks, and air quality readings were higher than expected, even though there were trees
- Tour Du Hospital, showed hospital staff how to cycle between sites, used air monitors
- Trucks have to drive into the bike lane to turn at Wellington and Cannon
- Air quality data was collected for a half hour one evening at the corner of Wellington and Cannon
- Air quality was the top priority surveyed in the Beasley neighbourhood

Questions/ Discussion

Susan C - Are there any other cities world wide who have gone through this type of project.

Elise D - Yes, New York City is a great example. Parts of Spain have done this with a bike share and infrastructure changes. Vancouver has done this. It takes collaboration, due to the need for funding and lots of voices at the table. You need a plan and you need people to use the applied changes and need to have citizens at the table and ask why they aren't using options and what would encourage them use them. Jennifer R - Mentioned transportation planning met with Friendly Streets, asks if PW attended any events.

Elise D - Traffic Safety Tech came out and said, "we can put this here, or that there, if you want this stop sign, we'd need to do a review", it's been more about feasibility. Talked to people about road design, and what makes some road classifications.

4. Hamilton Port Authority (25 minutes) Sara Yonson



Electricity is used, but only in winter, some diesel is used to prevent pipes from freezing

Questions/ Discussion

Andy S – Thinks it makes sense to have a strong organization behind it, everyone would have to use electricity.

Sara Y – Say says it has to be set across the board to have everyone use electricity.

Lynda L – Has noticed a few that were there for a while in the past, when they are out they are using fossil fuel?

Sara Y – Port Authority has a role like air traffic control at an airport. The vessels may have to wait because another is already at port.

Lynda L- Trucks cutting through downtown are from the harbor, we should chat to port and tenants about the other issues elsewhere in the transportation system.

Sara Y – It's a question of how you manage that. The Port Authority understands that it's part of the City of Hamilton.

Trevor I – Are you aware of any progress on Bunker C as a fuel source, is there other initiatives underway?

Sara Y – Bunker C vessels must have a scrubber by 2020 or vessels are to use marine diesel.

Trevor I – Looking at the "what if" scenarios, SO₂ model concern in West harbor area, looking at the new models with these new fuels being used.

Bruce N – Are there opportunities for Laker boats just in great lakes, to clean up faster than the national shipping industry?

Sara $Y - So_x$ regulations refer to all ships, energy efficiency design index is only for international vessels if it was applied to Great Lakes wouldn't be as effective all ports would need to be on board and everyone would have to be on board.

Chuck H – When a ship comes into port, are there regulations that they are to be electrified?

Sara Y – It's their choice.

Chuck H – What are the benefits?

Sara Y – Fuel is a concern, in winter, they are electrified, some tugs are turned off and not burning or using electricity.

Dan D – Is there a place where they have to switch to scrubbers/clean fuel Lakies and Salties.

Sara Y – When they reach the St. Lawrence they have to be.

Trevor I – Yes, we will when we have distribution materials ready.

Elise D – One of the groups of Mac Changers might align with this.

Trevor I – Will be meeting with them and can discuss, next steps are to have Kayli set up with a Hamilton email, if you're interested please respond.

6. UWDW Planning Committee (5 minutes) Shelley Rogers

Dan D – What's the theme?

Trevor I – Actions arising rom the Airshed model and next steps. Part of that will be through the AQTF and the AQTF action plan. Thinks should be action oriented.

Dan D – Air zone management would be a good topic.

Jenn R – Who's the audience?

Trevor I – In previous years, more people in the industry and academia. This conference will be aimed at academia more. The event has been held at the Sheraton in the past.

Lindsay G – Is it mainly people from Hamilton or is it regionally?

Trevor I – We usually have attendees from the GTHA, but we are starting to expand out.

They've been working with industry in advance of changes and local technical and industry standards, potentially deploying PM_{2.5} and PM₁₀ monitors. Had discussion with Environment Canada about pollution, resources and training and they are making upgrades to monitors and are working together.

Trevor I – Are the deployment stations locations chosen?

Natalie S – Former Gertrude and Depew area, other tbd.

Trevor I – Will the monitors be on HAMN.ca once they are up? Natalie S – Yes but will be tested first.

Environment Plan discussions are happening for increased roadside monitoring, Hamilton is prime location, Burlington Street would be a good location.

Rob C, Environmental Services, City of Hamilton

He's here because working on emissions form landfill sites, came to see if he'd fit into the group and about doing a presentation at a future meeting about catching landfill gas and GHG at a future meeting.

Susan C, The Lung Association

Connected with Matt L with Healthy and Safe Communities (City of Hamilton) and is championing a Radon program, suggests people check their homes for Radon, the only way you know, is by testing. Breath of Spring is coming out, sends fresh tulips out to senior homes, says if our workplaces want to get involved to reach out

Chuck H, Citizen

Gave assignment to his students, has them doing a travel audit for a two-week period, how far they walk drive bicycle, public transit etc. at the end of the two-week audit, they use a website and calculate their carbon footprint for each component of behaviour and says how they will reduce their carbon footprint by 50%, he might turn that into a paper, and will share it with the committee, lots of his students live in Hamilton than in the Niagara Region.

Andy S, Stelco Canada

They are working on technical standard for integrated steel. Big focus on their part, working on details of carbon backstop. Timeline is spring, (end of June). Lots on the go with that.

Sara Y, Hamilton Port Authority

Announcement amalgamation of Hamilton and the Oshawa Port Authorities. They have received national trades funding for Pier 15.
