2. Land Acknowledgement

The City of Hamilton is situated upon the traditional territories of the Erie, Neutral, Huron-Wendat, Haudenosaunee and Mississaugas. This land is covered by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, which was an agreement between the Haudenosaunee and Anishinaabek to share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. We further acknowledge that this land is covered by the Between the Lakes Purchase, 1792, between the Crown and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

Today, the City of Hamilton is home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island (North America) and we recognize that we must do more to learn about the rich history of this land so that we can better understand our roles as residents, neighbours, partners and caretakers (<u>source</u>).

4. DeGroote School of Business and Ward 3: Community Mapping Project (20 minutes) Lauren Reny, Erin Oughtred, Jennifer Hong, Maeve Reid, Nathaniel Will, Virginia Purvis, McMaster University



Discussion

How will the map be maintained over time? The intention of this McMaster program is to create reciprocal and ongoing relationships with community over time. Hopefully the project could become the work of future groups of students. The Ward 3 office is also committed to continuing work on the project.

How is the project sorting out Federal/Provincial/City by-law requirements where air/noise/lighting and odour are concerned? Starting with City by-laws at the moment, Provincial and Federal could be work of future groups of students.

What type of considerations have been given to how to convey information in a generalized sense after talking to a toxicologist? For now, the group is meeting with a toxicologist simply as a learning opportunity, will plan to look more into this component for future years of the project.

• Clarification was provided that it is challenging to communicate toxicological information due to complexities of communicating all the risks of daily life and providing proper context to the community.

How was data collected? Some information was publicly available online, phone calls were made to verify that info is specific to Hamilton area, if no success with web/phone outreach an in-person visit was made. Attempts to gather information received mixed results with some businesses very willing to provide details.

Recommendation was made that providing links to existing data, including CAH and mobile air monitoring reports would be helpful as well as including the HAMN air monitoring network. Suggestion to promote on social media as gateway site to all these additional sources of information.

Clarification was provided that emissions information is public on Dofasco's website. Gas Gebara can be contacted directly if needed for more information. The HIEA website also has a contact page with phone numbers/name/e-mail of members. 5. Carmeuse Dundas Proposal Concerns (20 minutes) Steve Smillie, Dundas & Greensville Environmental Concern Group



Discussion

Clarification was provided that CAH represents numerous stakeholders including industry, NGOs, public citizens, all three levels of government and is open to the information sharing that this presentation has accomplished as it allows for CAH to be aware of what's happening in the community. CAH can offer recommendations as appropriate.

George McKibbon was previously involved in advising a citizens group on a similar application regarding a cement facility. At the time of that work, they requested a Cumulative Effects Assessment and worst-case scenarios to be produced which was useful to show where in the community exceedances might occur. In the Hamilton area there are a lot of other sources of air and noise contaminants which is why those types of analyses are helpful. It is also important to check technical documents the applicant puts forward to ensure that mistakes aren't missed, as well as understanding that modelling requires substantial assumptions that also need to be clearly outlined and understood.

Shirook Ali recommended that time series monitoring should be correlated with the assumptions of the simulation in order to understand assumptions to predict future models. Data needs to be looked at holistically e.g. the sink and source must all be considered, and simulations don't pick up on all those details. ESI would be happy to share their learnings.

Recommendation was provided for the citizen's group to stay engaged and involved with the local MECP office. It's a slow process but community voices and feedback are heard in that process. Also noted that any feedstock that Carmeuse uses will have to be evaluated and there are controls in place.

• Citizen's group expressed that they currently don't feel like they are integrated into the process and that there is a lack of consultation.

Denis Corr advised that an adequate and detailed monitoring program should be in place if the project goes forward, as well as ongoing community oversite.

Councillor Alex Wilson supported moving the conversation forward on community monitoring. Clarified that residents have been participating in existing engagement processes but are concerned about those processes being inadequate, understanding that sometimes it does come down to staff time. Urged consideration of how we can support monitoring, evaluation or in other ways.

Kerry LeClair offered that Ward 3 sees opportunities to reach out for community building across neighbourhoods around similar issues of industrial emissions.

Mark Osborne- The group would like more information about when the last stack test was conducted and how much CO_2 is being emitted currently. Would like to see tests demonstrating that dioxins and furans are within Ministry guidelines.

7. Update: Dust Group (5 minutes) Shelley Rogers

The Dust Group is currently working on a campaign for dust and PM communications, which includes getting word out about the handbooks which can be found on <u>cleanairhamilton.ca/dust-handbooks/</u>. The construction handbook is now on the COH website too. They are also looking at communications for street sweeping and working with roads department on that piece. Also will be communicating general messaging.

8. CAH Funding Adjudication Criteria (5 minutes) Grace Higgins

Have received approval to submit the RFP to procurement and finalizing some changes to the adjudication criteria to ensure they are inclusive, allow for applications from diverse organizations and also align with CAH's Equity, Diversity and Inclusion policy. Thank you to Kerry, Shelley, Bruce and Sally for feedback. Final versions submitted to procurement will be posted on the CAH member portal.

Action: Grace to post updated criteria and application guide on CAH member portal.

9. Discussion: Transport Truck Idling (10 minutes) Shelley Rogers

We have received some complaints through public health about transport truck idling – has this come up before with CAH?

- Denis: It has come up historically. One of the issues is that drivers don't need to have the diesel engine idling to keep the truck comfortable. Recommended to contacting companies directly if someone comes across a truck that is idling. Trucks have an identifier on the side, and you can phone management and report the license plate of the truck, what time it was idling and that it is illegal under Hamilton by-law.
- Bruce noted that nothing around this issue has come up with CAH in the past six years.
- Geoffrey: Some businesses' Environmental Compliance Approval requires them to have alternate power to the units, depending on location of facility and number of trucks involved.
- Kerry: Ward 3 has had conversations with Hamilton Oshawa Port Authority with respect to their tenants.
- Pascale: Ward 4 has had issues with trucks idling while loading or in vicinity of loading location. Issues come from a let that happened at the provincial level that allows trucks to idle at a business. As the city, we aren't able to enforce if they are idling at a business, only if idling on the street. That law changed during the pandemic.

Action: Kerry to share notes from Ward 3 complaints. Pascale also to share details about Ward 4 enforcement issues.
