### 2. Land Acknowledgement

This land is covered by the Dish With One Spoon Wampum Belt Covenant, which was an agreement between the Haudenosaunee and Anishinaabek to share and care for the resources around the Great Lakes. We further acknowledge that this land is covered by the Between the Lakes Purchase, 1792, between the Crown and the Mississaugas of the Credit First Nation.

Today, the City of Hamilton is home to many Indigenous people from across Turtle Island (North America) and we recognize that we must do more to learn about the rich history of this land so that we can better understand our roles as residents, neighbours, partners and caretakers (source).

4. Active Transportation and Air Quality Awareness (20 minutes), Reed Ciarloni, McMaster University



#### **Discussion**

- <u>Portland State University initiative</u> for bicycle and pedestrian innovation was recommended as a model for similar work.
- What was the sample size for the survey? 200 it was a volunteer sample, disseminated through posters around the city and advertised online.
- Comment that a generation ago air quality was a much more significant concern
   has it improved so much that cyclists don't even think about it?
- Was socioeconomic status taken into consideration? Some people will bike or walk to work regardless of AQHI, might not have another means of transportation. Most of the sample was higher earning and well-educated, did not find correlation between socioeconomic status and AQHI checking.
- Are there online tools for individuals to determine the lowest pollution route of choice? Used to be a mapping tool in Vancouver that's not longer funded. London, England has an app for residents to determine least polluted route. Google map layer with AQHI is available in US but not Canada.

- 6. Overview of MECP Air Monitoring Data Review (20 minutes), Natalie Stacey, Abigail Amponsah & Tim Hung, MECP



## **Discussion**

- Just before Easter the province released proposed 2023 Provincial Planning Statement which revises many policies with respect to land use compatibility with one of the key issues being public health and safety. It seems some exceedances would have public health and safety implications. Any considerations for how municipalities could use this data to implement public health and safety requirements of Provincial Planning Statement guidelines? Can the exceedance counts be used to assess land use compatibility required in various draft PPS 2023 policies?
  - Exceedance counts are used to get a sense of trends and level of exceedances. In a given area even if the exceedance level is low, if number over time are increasing it will be flagged to district and focus will be made on that area to determine issues.
  - MECP is not lead for PPS, so not a lot of involvement but will take it back. Although information is publicly available, the data it is very focused on Hamilton's industrial area. Data is collected from MECP on ambient locations, but the info is quite different than the exceedance counts Abigail outlined. Would be a great opportunity potentially to speak to for the future. The focus of this presentation is more on industrial data and the info at ambient locations will differ significantly.
- Clarification that HAMN is an independent third party, with assistance provided by Rotek.
- What were the three criteria that are evaluated when determining when to issue a
  low poor air quality notification? AQHI above a set threshold, whether or not the
  number is driven by level of particulates and if it is, confirming meteorological

- conditions to determine whether an inversion is occurring in Hamilton during that period.
- Regarding managing outliers in the data set how is that handled? There is an Operations Manual for Air Quality Monitoring in Ontario that is followed by industry and MECP and sets out steps to validate data. As far as statistical analysis, box plots are used to pin point the source. If you can't identify source of an outlier what do you do? There is a long period of data in Hamilton, so we know the standard deviation and can clearly see when there's an outlier. When there is something abnormal, contact Rotek and validate data point is it an instrumentation issue? Is this number reasonable for this type of contaminant? Once confirmed that it is a valid number, might contact company to see if there was a spill or abnormal event for example.
- HAMN's 2021 Annual Air Quality Monitoring Report is expected to be released on their <u>website</u> in the next couple of weeks. There were a couple of data issues that caused a delay.
- Is the HAMN data correlated with the applicable standards? The standards are listed on the HAMN Network website, in some cases you would need to download the data and compare it yourself.
- Has CAH considered adding a health scale similar to <u>Clean Air Sarnia and Area's</u> monitoring website?
  - The MECP has recommended it to HAMN, it would be great to see as it makes the information more easily digestible. Would be best to contact Neil Buonocore the HAMN Administrator to discuss.
  - HAMN network operates significantly different than the CASA website, HAMN is industry partners that contract a monitoring firm to get the data. Further dialogue would be helpful, there is a challenge with HAMN not having expertise to provide level of interpretation that is provided on CASA.
- Clarification that continuous benzene monitoring was recently deployed in January 2023 to St Christopher's Park. Not publicly reported yet but the MECP is considering it as a long-term option if that monitoring station will remain in place indefinitely.
